# Script for Voter/Non-Voter Intercept Interviews

This is a summary version of the researchers' script for interviews with voters and nonvoters as part of a project on how voters get information for the Future of California Elections. Participants were recruited through intercepts in public places.

### Intercept

Hi – we're doing a study about whether people have seen election information that they're supposed to get. Can I ask you 4 quick questions about elections?

Are you registered to vote right now?

Have you voted before?

When was the last election you voted in?

The last time you voted, what did you use to vote?

If they qualify:

Would you spend a little more time with us to give some feedback about some voter information we're working on? 20 minutes? We have a little thank you at the end.

### Consent

We're doing a study to learn about how people use information about voting and elections. The study is funded by a group called Future of California Elections. We're going to ask you about where you get your information about voting and elections and ask you to have a look at some examples and give us some feedback about it.

### **Demographics**

We want to make sure that we have a good variety of people.

Ask the questions on the demographics form.

# Introduction to the sources of information

One of the things we're interested in is where you get information about voting and elections.

This sheet [ *hand it to them* ] shows all the places and people we could think of where someone might get information about voting and elections. There are circles inside each box [*point*]. And stars.

First, let's use the circles to mark everything you recognize as someplace you have gotten information about voting and elections. We're especially interested in things you have actually used to learn about voting and elections. Just put an X in the circle when you see something where you've gotten information about voting or elections before.

Now let's mark the stars those for things you **want** to use. Then we can talk about what you've come up with. Ok? They might be the same things you've used before. That's okay.

Anything to add – something you have used **or** want to use, or both?

Mark what they select, so you can ask about their choices.
